Exploring Peer Health Coach (PHC) Roles in the Online Health-Management Program for Adults with Spinal Cord Injury (SCI)



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Introduction

296,000 people in the US are living with Spinal Cord Injury (SCI) **30%** require re-hospitalization in 1 year post discharge(NSCISC, 2021).

- Individuals with SCI are at higher risk of developing **secondary health issues**, many of which can be prevented or managed by health management knowledge & strategies (Houlihan et al., 2017).
- **Gap:** Services, resources, & self management tools in community currently inadequate for individuals with SCI (Allin et al., 2020).

SCI Peer Health Coach (PHC) can play powerful role in promoting health management as are **trained** to support peers as they adjust to life changes & manage health challenges (Skeels et al., 2017). SCI&U: online health management program which utilizes SCI-

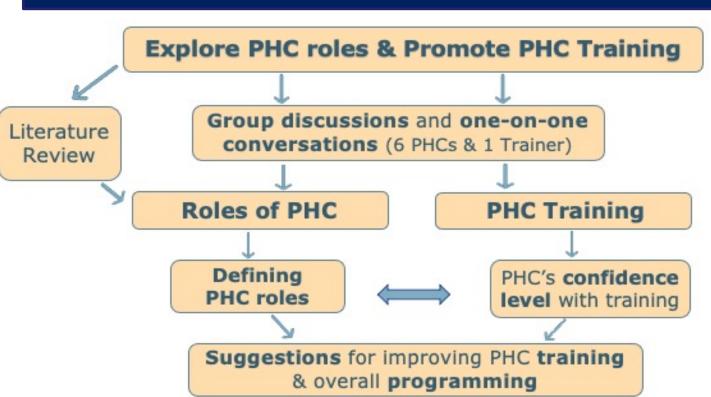
PHCs & has shown potential to improve self-efficacy, quality of life & ability to address secondary SCI complications (Allin et al., 2020).

International cooperation between UToronto and United Spinal Association. Research approved though **REB** of Utoronto.

Aims:

- Describe the innovative **PHC role** in relation to traditional roles of "peer" & peer mentor".
- Evaluate the current **PHC training** process within SCI&U.

Methods



- The investigator observed **24 PHC team meetings** to build relationship with the team & inform the training evaluation as well as the PHC roles.
- **Training materials** were reviewed & categorized to match different roles PHC served in the coaching sessions.
- **Current literature** related to PHC & peer mentor was reviewed to develop an overall **understanding** & to inform **PHC roles**.

Results

PHC Definition & Characteristics

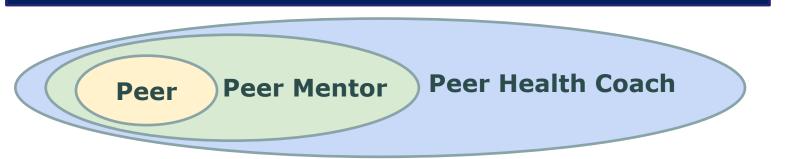
- PHCs receive over 6 months of evidence-based training & **certificate** & participate *weekly* team meeting.
- PHCs meet people where they're at & tailor coaching to their needs.
- PHCs share lived experience, assist with problem solving & skill **development** & **empower** peers to work effectively towards goals.
- PHCs focus on health-management, including social participation, mental health, independence, self-efficacy, adaptation, knowledge/resource sharing, etc.
- SCI-PHC is a meaningful & rewarding **paid** job.

PHC Training

- Interpersonal/Interactive skill base
 - Relationship building
 - Shared story
 - Affirmation statement
 - Reflective listening
- Professional skill base / Certification
- **External** institution:
 - Brief action plan (BAP)
 - Mental health first aid*
- **Internal** training:
 - Identifying support system*
 - Resource review/organize*
 - In-between call text support
 - Peer sharing coaching experience
 - Role play/simulation

PHCs feel confident for most of the training items; need support in Mental **Health First Aid, resource review & identifying support system.

Peer Mentor

- Unintentional unstructured relationship
- Share lived experience
- Intentional short-term
- Focus on **empathizing** Focus on solving **immediate needs** by
 - - information sharing - Share lived experience
 - SCI related knowledge and management skills

Peer Health Coach

- Intentional long-lasting structured relationship unstructured relationship
 - Focus on **developing skills** and **Behavior Change** for long-term interdependence.
 - Share lived experience
 - SCI related knowledge & management skills
 - Language-based/defined professional skill set
- PHC switch between roles naturally to meet the specific needs of peers.
- **Training** is the 'gear stick' that allows a PHC to recognize and shift into different modes as needed.

Conclusions

SCI-PHCs are:

- People with SCI who use their lived experience & training to interact with and support peers in developing skills, strategies, and solutions to improve and maintain all aspects of their health including physical, emotional, mental, and social health.
- Unique & powerful part of an individual's rehabilitation team and serve as messengers between peers and healthcare workers.
